Frequently Asked Questions

I already know the course content. Why do I need to train in the online version of the course?

All instructors of PLS 3rd Learning online courses must take the online version of the course regardless of their experience with teaching the course on-site and/or their knowledge of the course content. The learning activities and interactions within the online version of the course differ greatly from those of the on-site version despite the common course outcomes. As you can imagine, experiencing the different interface for the course is a valuable experience. A certified instructor of the PLS 3rd Learning face-to-face course is exempt from repeating redundant tasks that are in the online version of the course. It is expected that the trainee will participate in all other course interactions and assignments.

I already teach online courses for another entity. Why must I participate and be certified in the Developing Online Facilitation Skills?

Teachers can choose from many online courses to further their education. The quality of available learning experiences varies greatly. PLS 3rd Learning chooses to distinguish itself from all other online providers by ensuring that all participants in PLS 3rd Learning online courses are engaged in the best learning experiences available in the market. This includes collaborating with course instructors who are highly skilled in the nuances of excellent online teaching.

Participation in the ***Developing Online Facilitation Skills*** (DFS) Training is based on the premise that there are very specific technical, communication, and teaching knowledge and skills that we expect all of our instructors to begin to master prior to teaching a PLS 3rd Learning online course. We believe that it is imperative that our instructors create a community of learners and that the skills to create that community are taught and

modeled in the ***Developing Online Facilitation Skills*** (DFS). Our experience has been that experienced online instructors do not necessarily come to us with that expertise.

What technical requirements must I have to teach online?

- Reliable computer
- High-speed Internet access
- Virus protection software installed on your computer
- Preferred Operating Systems: Windows Vista or above, or Mac OS X or above
- Preferred Browsers: For an optimal experience, use the most current version of Internet Explorer 10 (PC), or Mozilla Firefox (PC or Mac)
- Required Software: Microsoft Word
- Required Web Browser Plug-In: Adobe® Acrobat® or Adobe® Reader™. This plug-in is required to view any of the PDFs within a course. Adobe® Reader™ may be downloaded for free using the following link: [Adobe](#)

How many hours a week should I expect to be online?

You should plan on spending 2 hours or more per day online for a class of 15 participants. Some days you may only be online for less than an hour and other days you may spend 4-6 hours online reading discussions, grading assignments, and posting comments. It is expected that you log into the online class at least every 24 hours to check messages and make sure everything is going well in the course. It's necessary to inform your participants if you will be away from the class for over 24 hours. If you will not be able to access the course for 48 hours, you should contact Judy Lalli (215.872.0233) who will have another instructor monitor your class.

How much do online instructors get paid?

PLS 3rd Learning pays online instructors \$155 per participant.

How much does training cost?

There is no cost for training unless the candidate is taking the course for credit. For most course trainings, the trainees must purchase their own materials.

How many participants are in a class?

The number of participants per class generally ranges from 7 to 18. In some cases, an instructor may have the option to teach a course with fewer than 7 participants.

What technical skills must I have to be an online instructor?

You should have intermediate computer skills. You are expected to be proficient with email sending and receiving attachments, and basic Internet navigation. Some courses involve more technical expertise. Some courses require specific content experience. You will become experienced with our Learning Management system when you take an online course as a participant, and you will learn the essential behind-the-scenes operations when you take the ***Developing Online Facilitation Skills*** (DFS) training course.

How much technical support am I expected to give to participants?

Although technical support is available through Sakai 24/7, you will be the first person your participants turn to if they have a problem. For that reason, you should be comfortable with the Sakai navigation system. You should also be familiar with the information available through the Sakai help menu, which is part of every course.

I enjoy communicating, but I don't type very well. Can I still be an online instructor?

Because almost all interactions happen through typed communication, being proficient at typing is a necessary skill for online teaching.

Will I only communicate with participants in writing?

Almost all interactions transpire online through written communication; therefore all online instructors are expected to be proficient writers utilizing proper grammar, sentence structure and spelling. In addition to communicating online, instructors make introductory phone calls to all participants before the class begins. Additional phone calls may be necessary to help and support some participants.

What is the format of PLS 3rd Learning online classes?

PLS 3rd Learning courses are offered via the Sakai learning management system. Courses are eight weeks long with 24/7 access. They are instructor-led with weekly deadlines. There are no scheduled meeting times or required synchronous discussions, so participants may work at any time of the day or night they choose. As an instructor, you must check into the class at least once a day to read and respond to participants' postings and assignments.

How is the online version of the course different from the on-site version?

The course outcomes (as stated in the syllabus) are the same for both online and on-site courses with the same title. While much of the content and knowledge is the same, learning activities will vary between the on-site and online versions of a course.

How much interaction is there between the instructor and participants?

The instructor oversees the course for the entire eight-week period. Instructors initially connect with participants through a welcome email and phone call prior to the start date and maintain daily interaction within the course through class discussions, private messages, chat office hours, and individual feedback on assignments. What kind of assignments are participants expected to complete? How are they submitted to the instructor?

Typical assignments include small- and large-group class discussions, article reviews, research, classroom applications, and other collaborative activities. All learning activities are submitted using the Sakai learning management system. Some are posted to a class discussion area for all participants to read and reply. Instructors read all discussions and responses that are posted in this area, adding comments that guide participants toward deeper insights and awareness. Other learning activities are submitted privately to the instructor for feedback and grading. Grades are posted by midnight each Thursday.

How many hours are participants expected to be online per week?

Participants should plan to spend approximately 6-8 hours per week online or about 2 hours per day. Some learning activities, such as readings from a text, are completed off-line.
